### You can help expand school breakfast in New Jersey.

A good breakfast helps students focus in class, score higher on standardized tests and avoid trips to the school nurse. When children are hungry, they cannot concentrate on a reading assignment or solve a math problem.

Despite strong evidence of the benefits of school breakfast, New Jersey ranks 46<sup>th</sup> in the nation for its participation in this federal child nutrition program.

While most New Jersey schools offer breakfast, it is typically served before school. Many children simply cannot get to school with enough time to eat breakfast before the first bell rings.

Some school districts in New Jersey and around the country are overcoming this logistical challenge by serving breakfast in the classroom or using other innovative approaches.

Districts that adopt these more creative methods report significant increases in participation rates and improvement in student behavior and performance.
