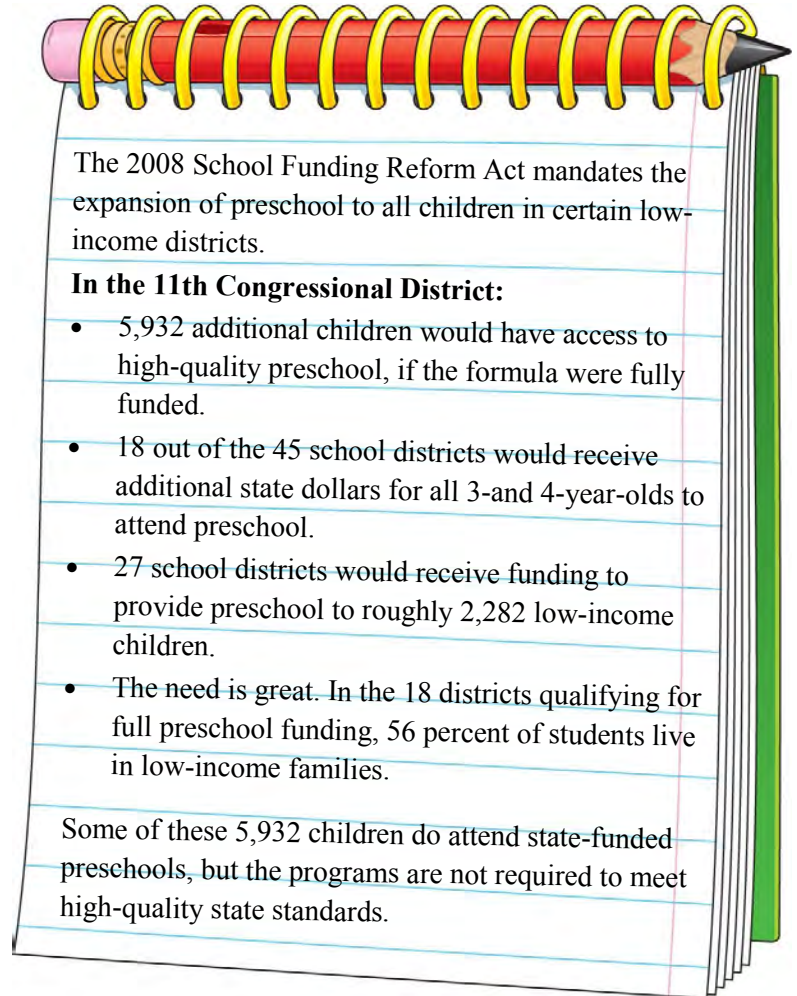

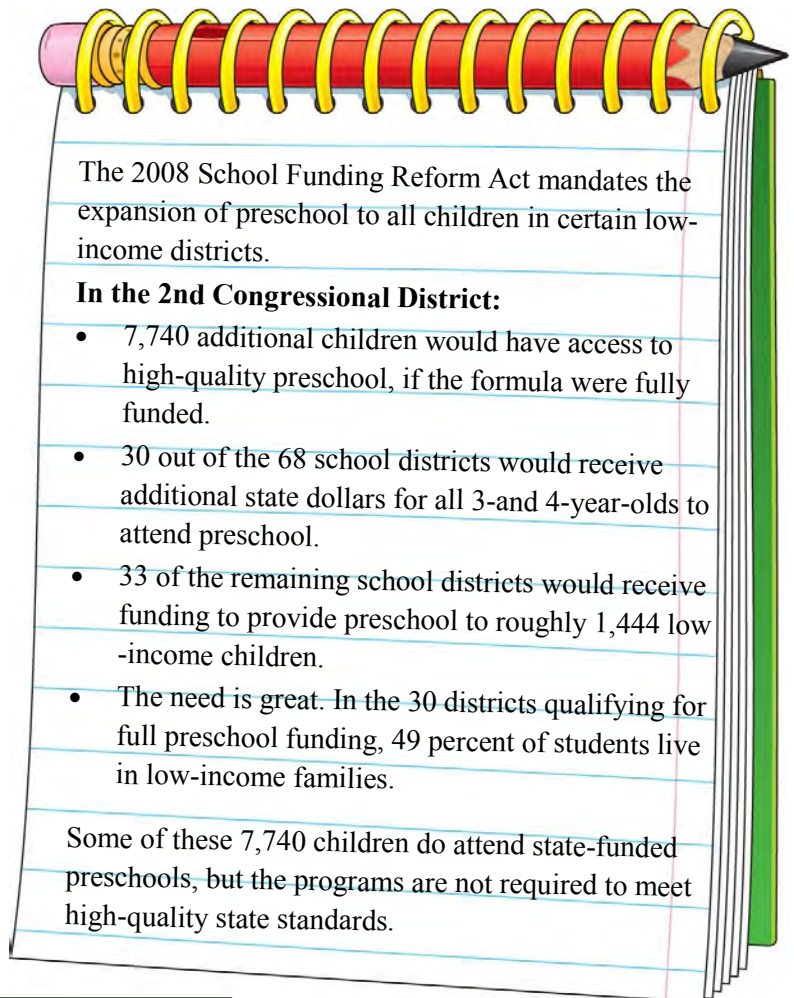

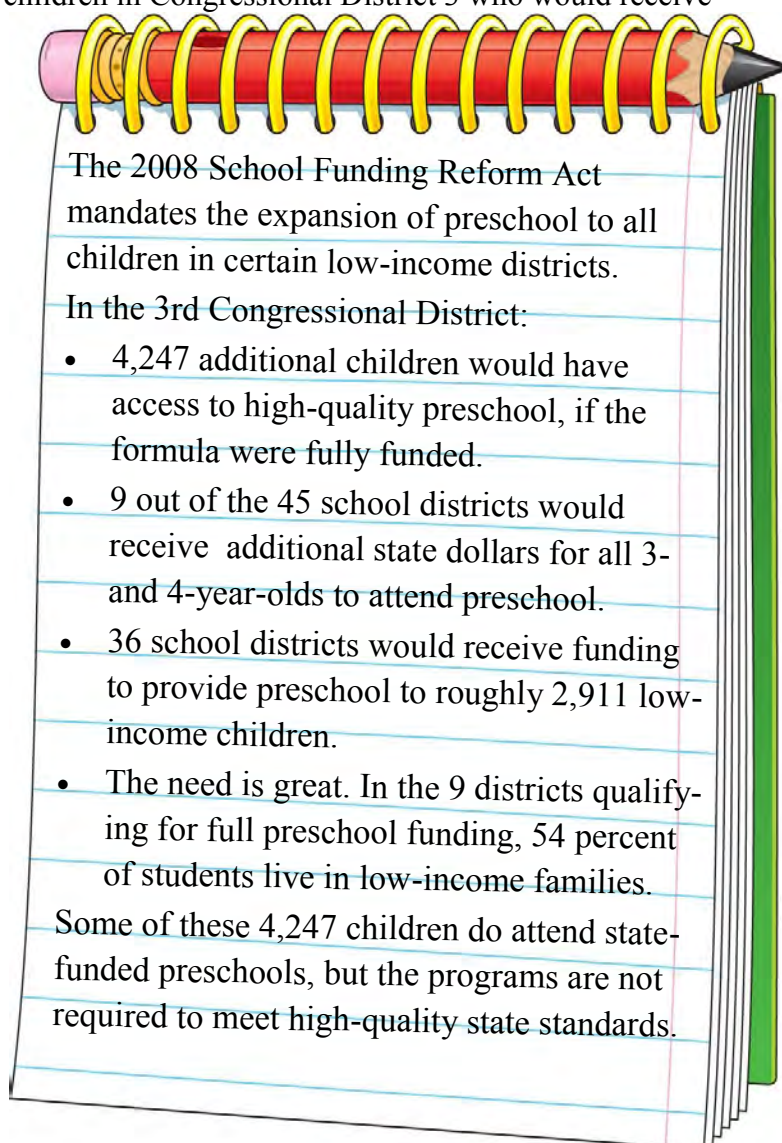

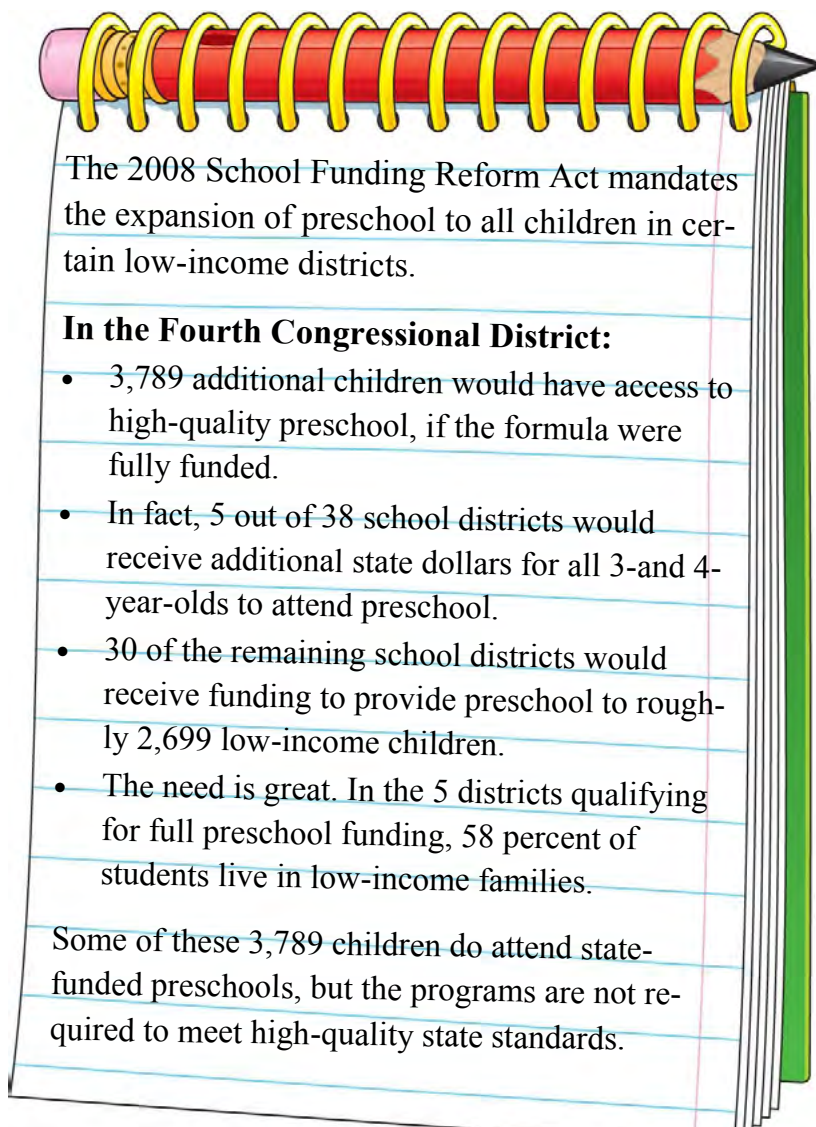

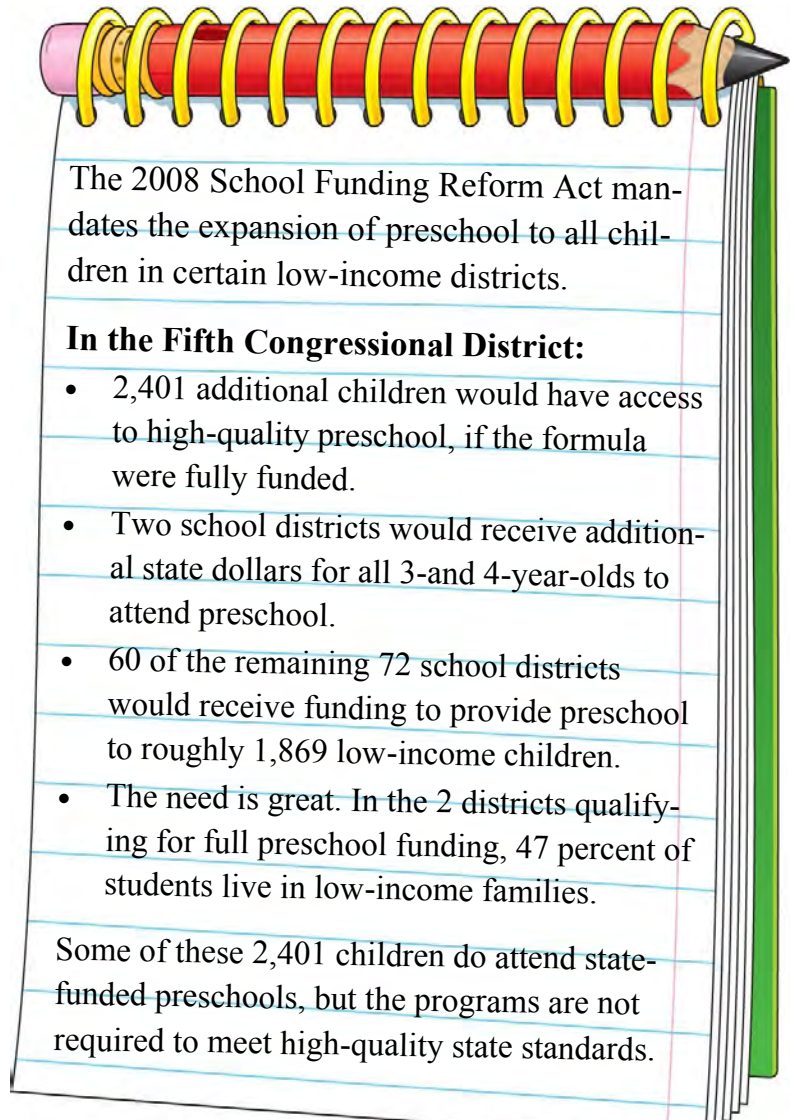

The 2008 School Funding Reform Act mandates the expansion of preschool to all children in certain low-income districts.

**In the Sixth Congressional District:**

- 3,075 additional children would have access to high-quality preschool, if the formula were fully funded.
- In fact, 4 out of 22 school districts would receive additional state dollars for all 3- and 4-year-olds to attend preschool.
- 16 of the remaining school districts would receive funding to provide preschool to roughly 2,257 low-income children.
- The need is great. In the 4 districts qualifying for full preschool funding, 49 percent of students live in low-income families.

Some of these 3,075 children do attend state-funded preschools, but the programs are not required to meet high-quality state standards.

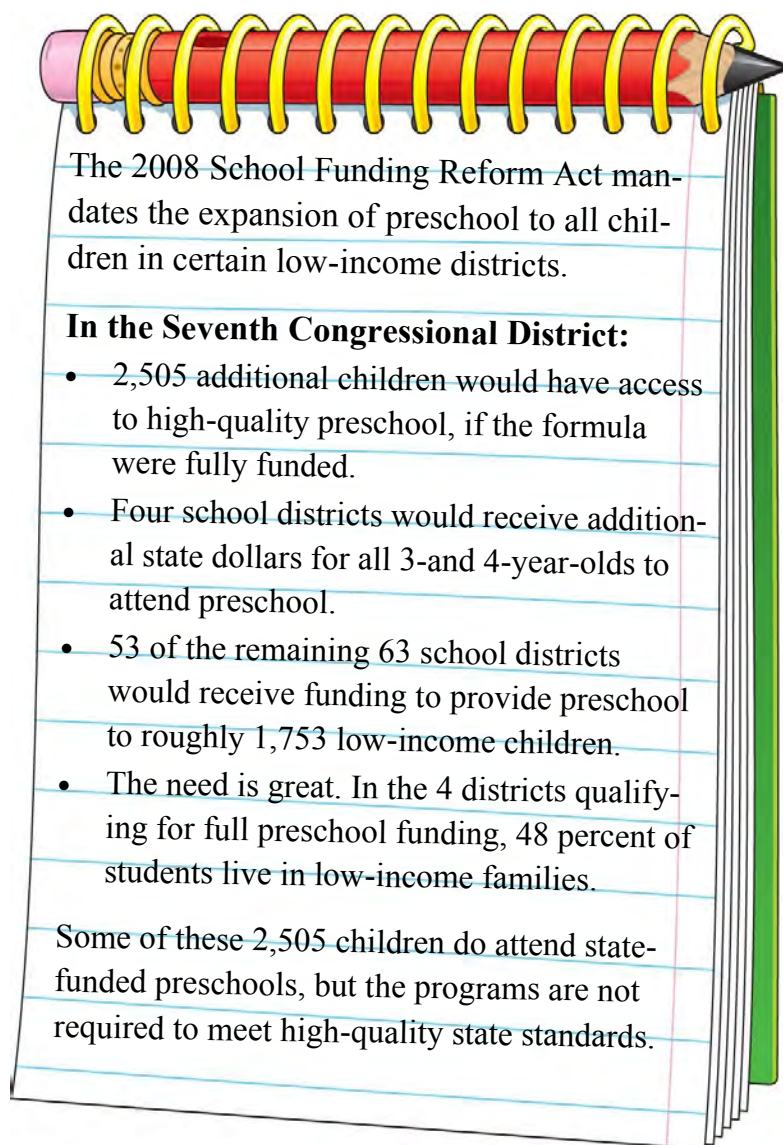

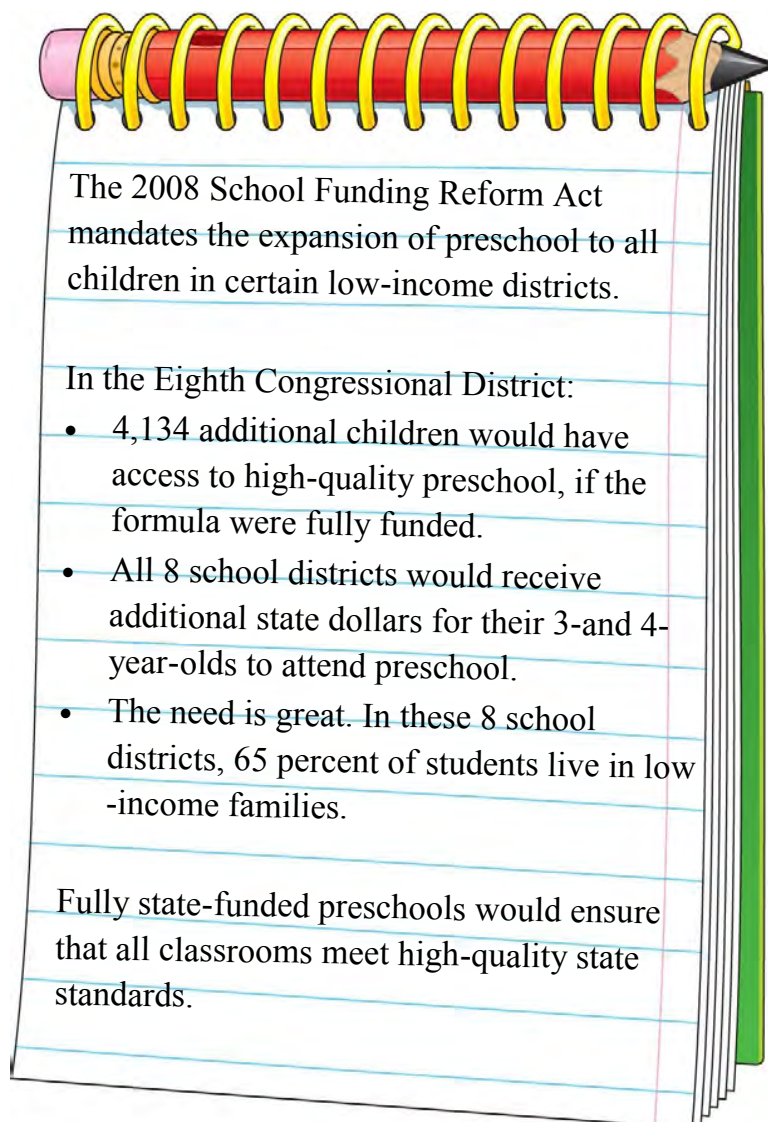

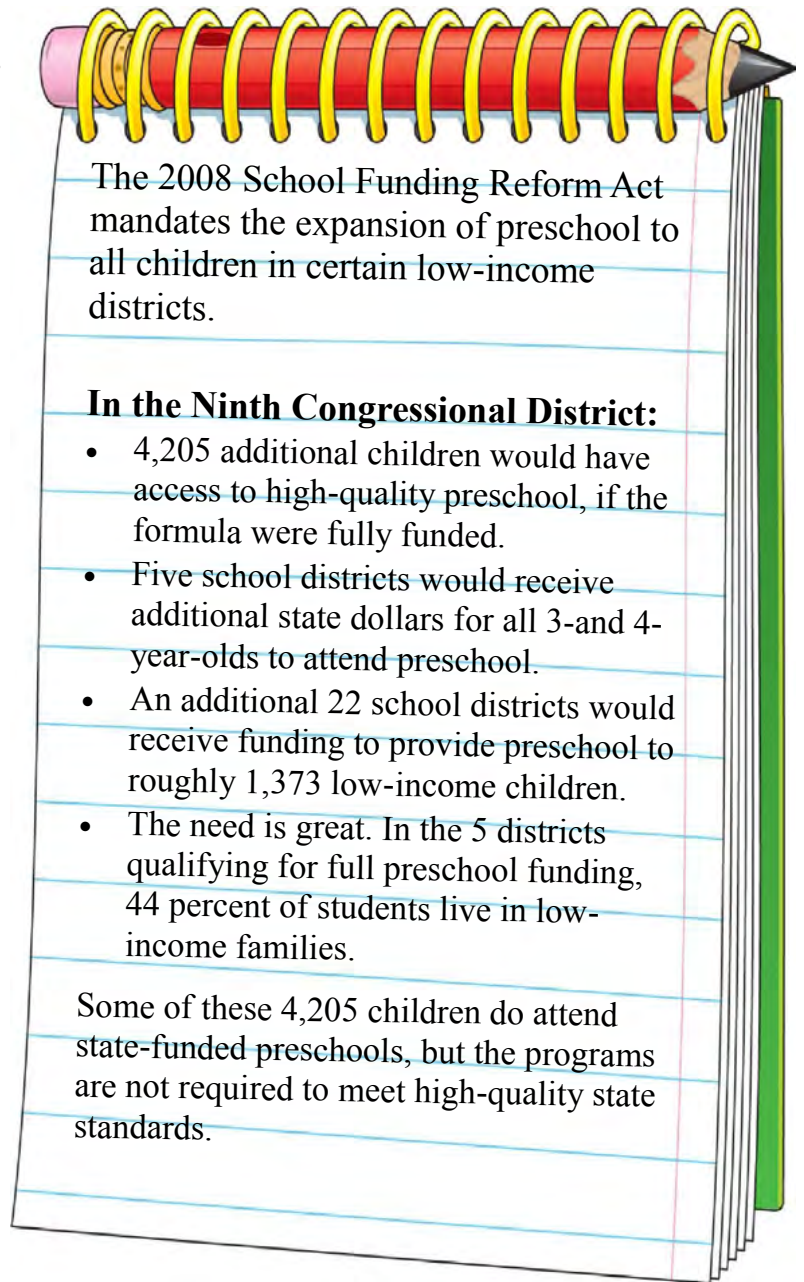

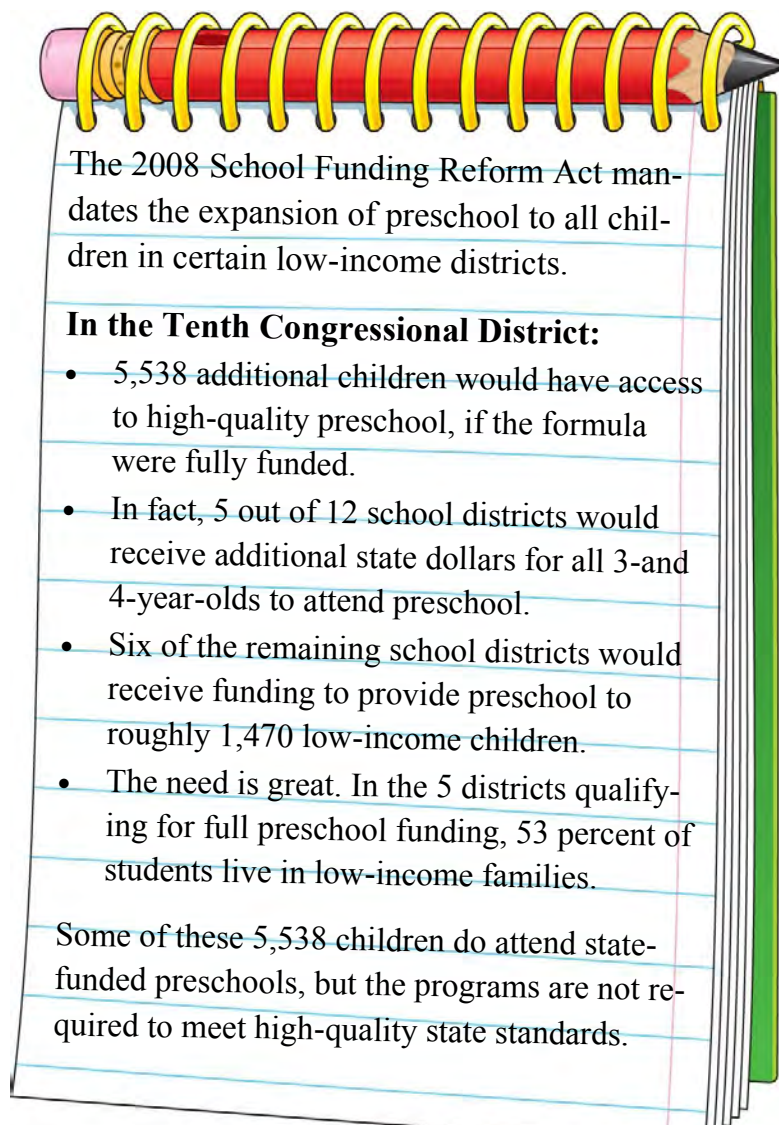

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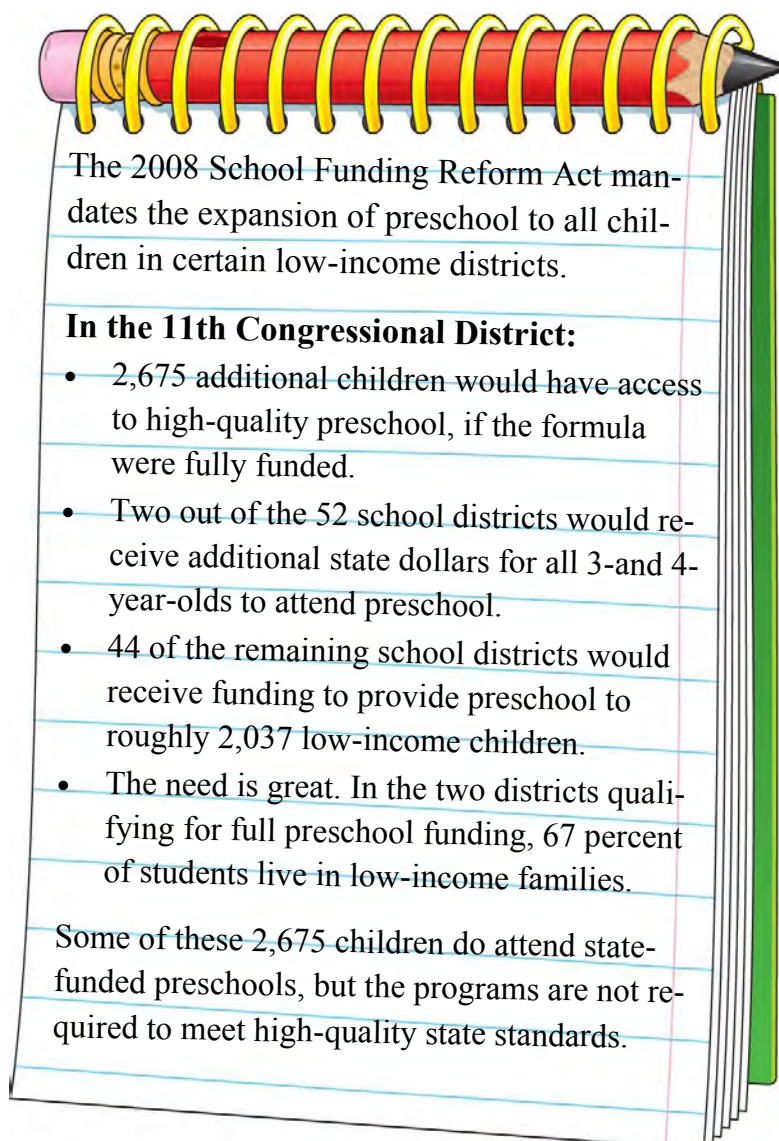

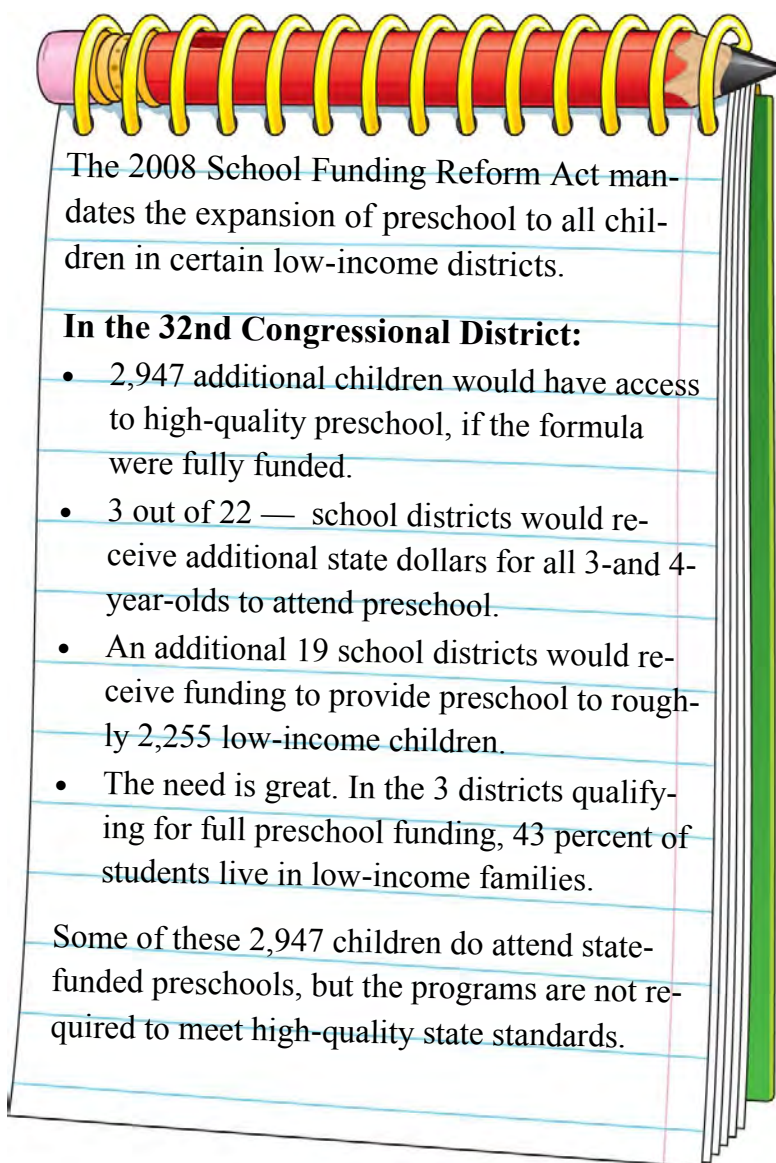
