Newark Demographics

- In 2015, **68,415** children lived in Newark.
 - **3 percent** of N.J.'s overall child population, and **36 percent** of Essex.

- **9 percent** of Newark's children were born in a foreign country, compared to **7 percent** 5 years ago.



Racial/Ethnic Demographics

- Children Under 18 in Newark:
 - **51 percent** Black or African American
 - **41 percent** Hispanic
 - **7 percent** non-Hispanic white
 - **19 percent** some other race

- Percentages **do not** total to 100.

Economically Disadvantaged Kids

- 2015, Federal Poverty Thresholds:
 - 2 adults, 2 children
 - 50 percent: \$12,018
 - 100 percent: \$24,036
 - 200 percent: \$48,072
- **39 percent** of Newark children lived below 100 percent of the poverty threshold, and **70 percent** lived below 200 percent of threshold.
 - Compared to **16 percent** and **32 percent** for the state.

N.J. Earned Income Tax Credit

- EITC helps put money back in the pockets of struggling families.
- In 2015:
 - More than **22,000** Newark recipients (with a dependent <19 yrs. old)
 - Average credit amount jumped from **\$620** in 2014 to **\$950** in 2015.
 - Jump in refund amount due to an increase in NJ refund as a percentage of the Federal EITC



Housing Costs

- In 2015, the median rent in Newark was **\$978** a month, a slight increase from the 2011 figure of **\$963** a month.
- **62** percent of Newark's households spend more than 30 percent of their income on rent. **56 percent of Essex** and **50 percent** of NJ's residents can say the same.

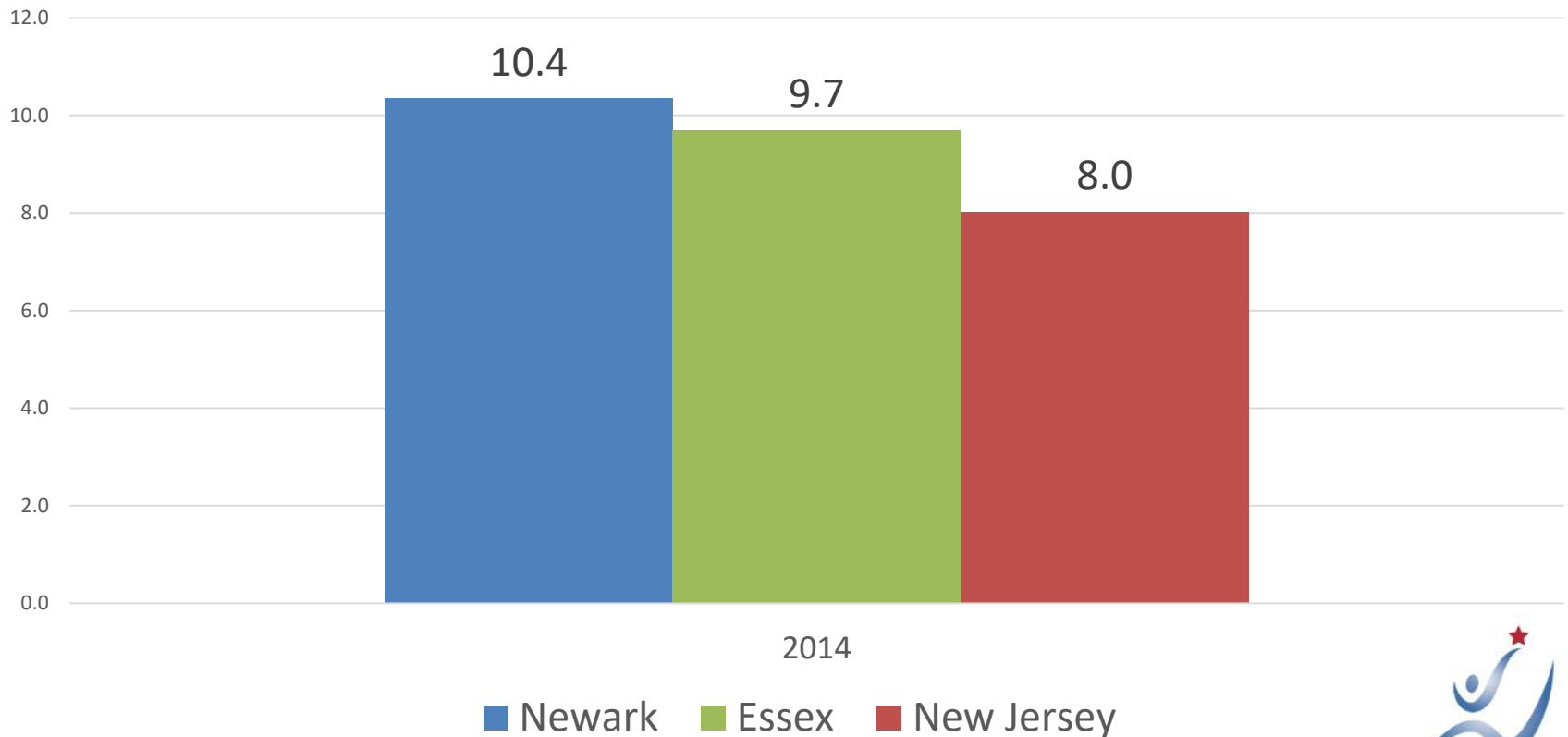


Nutritional Benefits

- In 2016, **34,532** children received NJ SNAP, a **7 percent** increase from 2012 (**32,255**).
- In 2016, there were **12,709** WIC recipients in Newark, compared to **13,857** in 2012.

Infant Mortality

- Infant mortality rates for Newark rose in 2014 to **11.6** per 1,000 live births from **8.6** in 2010.

- **Infant mortality =**

- $$\frac{\text{\# of infant deaths in a given year}}{\text{\# of live births in a given year}} \times 1000$$



Health Insurance

- In 2015, only **6.5 percent** of Newark's children lived without health insurance.
 - A mere **3.7 percent** of children in N.J. were without insurance.
- As of March 2016, **69,353** children received health insurance through NJ FamilyCare.
 - A **26 percent** increase from 2012.



Child Protection

- As of June 2016, **3,758** total Newark children were under CP&P supervision
 - **2,948** in-home placements
 - **810** out-of-home placements
- Of the **5,811** Newark children reported for abuse or neglect in 2015, **11.4 percent** had a substantiated or established finding of abuse or neglect.



Home Visitation

- More Newark children and families benefitted from home visitation programs, up from **299** in 2014 to **356** in 2016.
- Home visitation programs help parents build healthy environments for their infants and young children through the help of a trained professional.



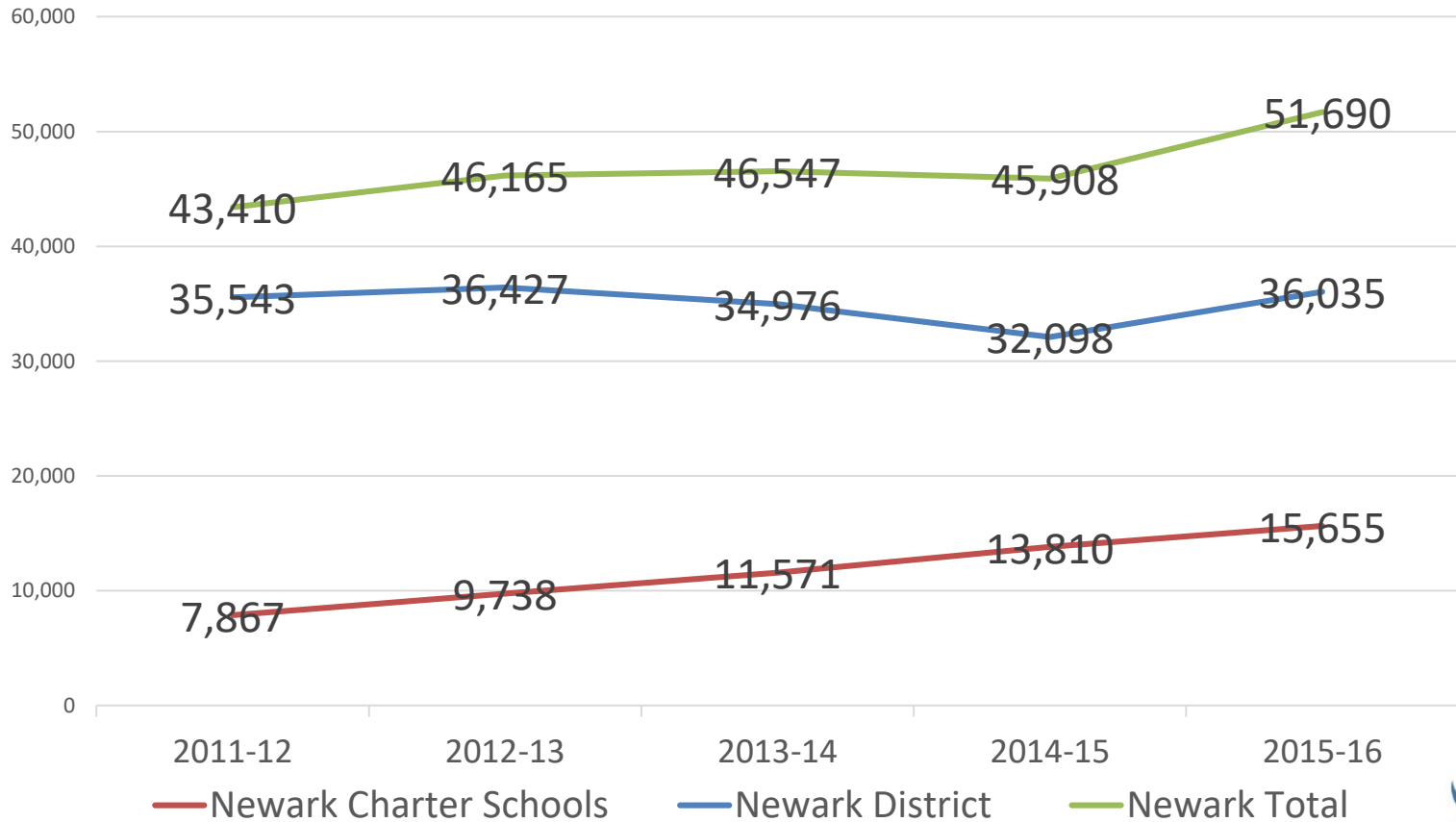
Early Childhood



- 2015-16 Newark Pre-K enrollment:
 - 6,821 students
- 2015-16 Kindergarten Enrollment:
 - 4,114 students
 - 2,508 enrolled in district schools.
 - 1,606 enrolled in charter schools.

Pre-K-12 Total Enrollment, Newark

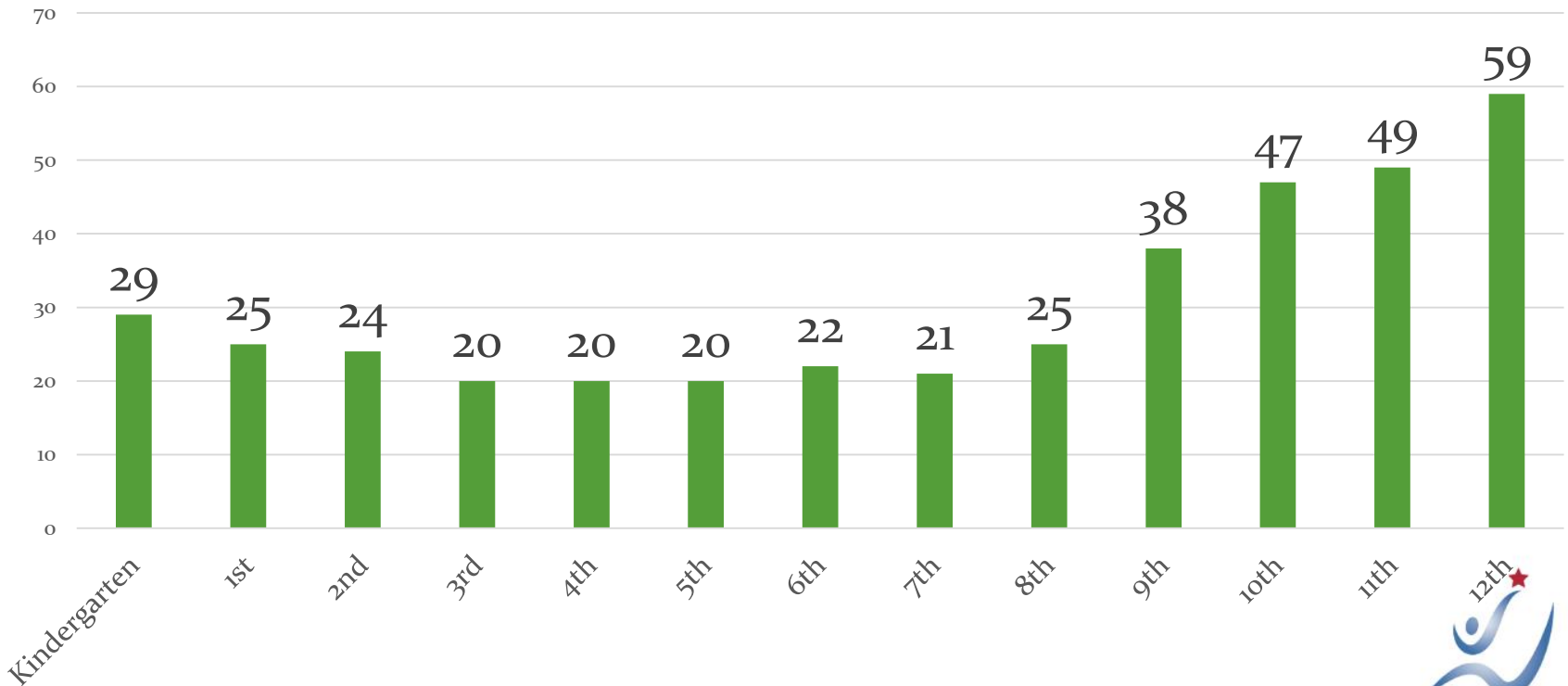


PARCC Scores and Graduation Rates

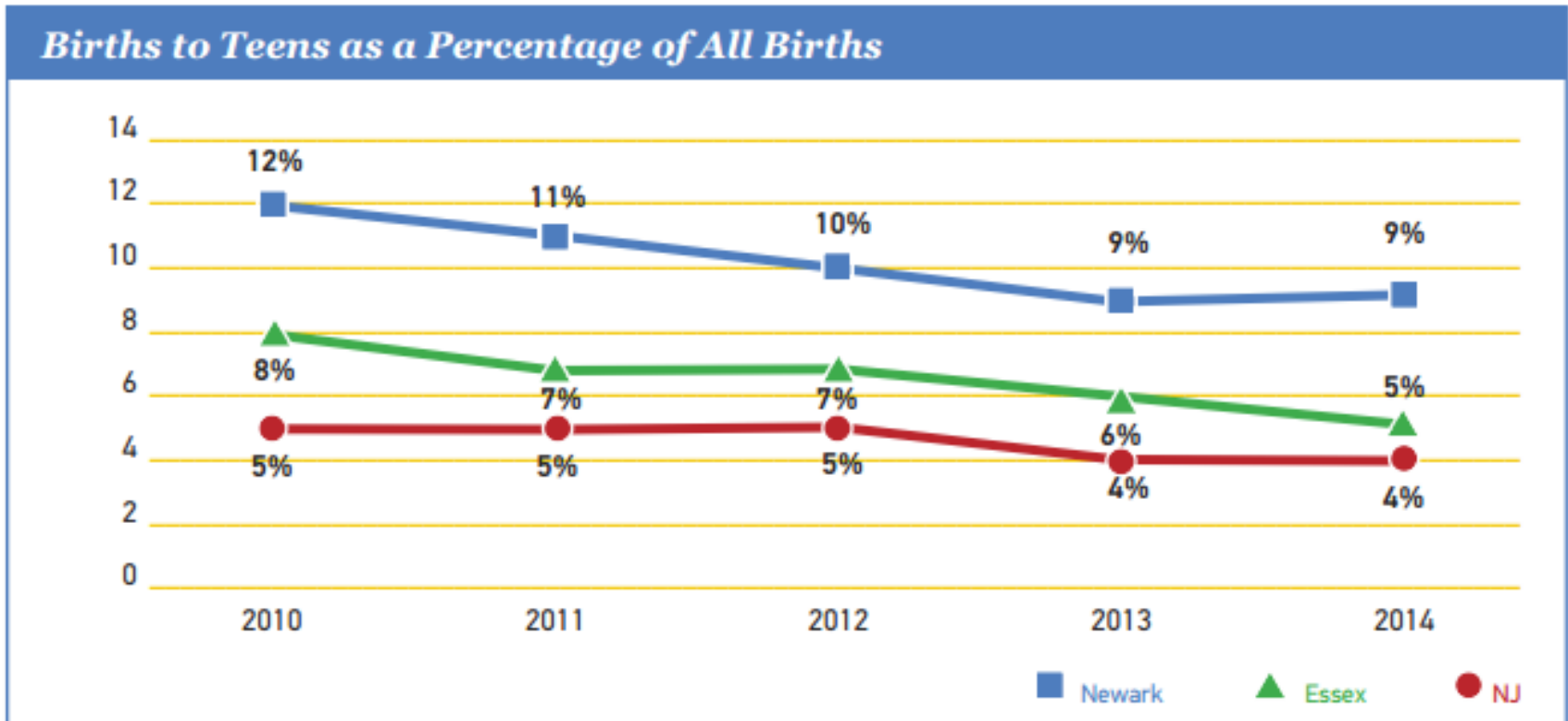
- Newark District PARCC scores below state avg. for '15-16
 - 4th Grade ELA: **27 percent** meeting or exceeding expectations, compared to **54 percent** of NJ students
- Class of 2015—Newark District had an adjusted cohort graduation rate of **73**
 - NJ graduation rate = **90**

Percentage of Newark District Students Chronically Absent by Grade, 2015-16 %

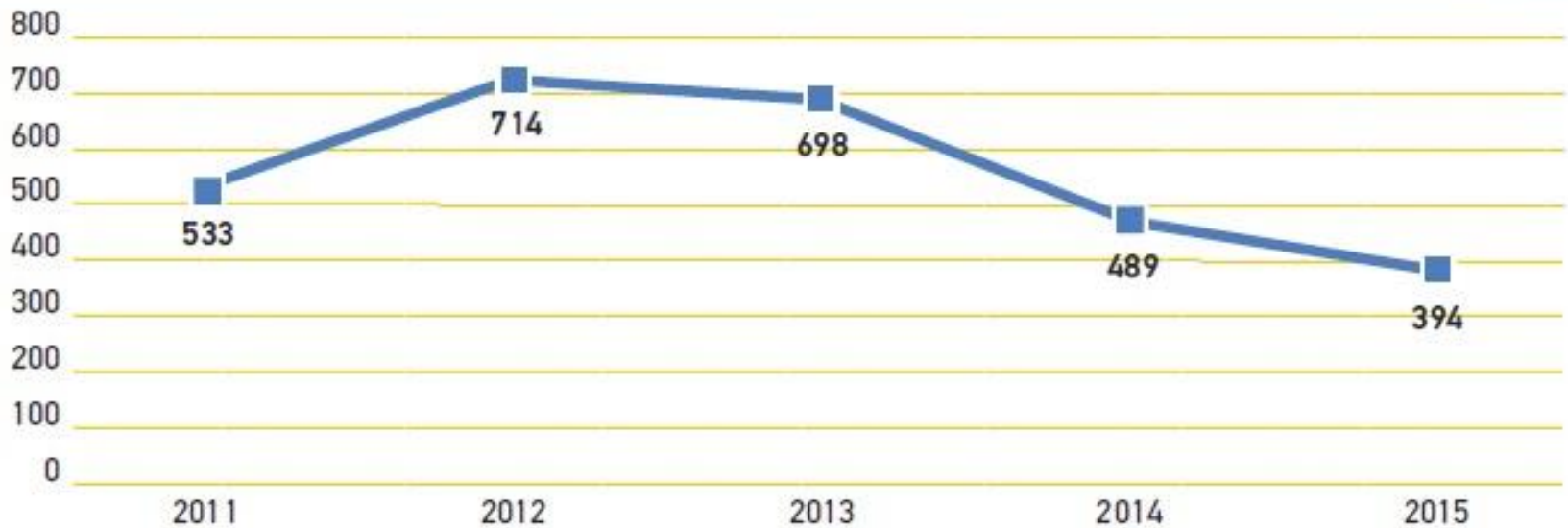

Admissions to Detention

- Newark Annual Admissions to Detention
 - Decreased by **27 percent** overall (from 2011-2015).
 - Newark comprised **60 percent** of admissions to Essex County detention in 2015.

Admissions to Detention

- Why the decrease in detention admissions?
 - Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative
 - New Jersey signed on in 2004—recognized as a national model in 2008
 - A multi-faceted approach to reducing the detention population
 - Diminish usage of detention where inappropriate.
 - Focus on returning youth to their communities while addressing issues that led to criminal behavior.
