HEALTH PROGRAM CUTS FOLLOW ACHA, AND OTHER GOP PROPOSALS

FY 18 APPROPRIATIONS OUTLOOK

HILL REPUBLICANS DON'T ALL AGREE WITH WHITE HOUSE SPENDING REDUCTIONS

• Many oppose proposed reductions at the State, Energy and Transportation departments, independent agencies

SENATE DEMOCRATS RETAIN SIGNIFICANT LEVERAGE IN SPENDING FIGHT

- Appropriations measures require 60 votes to overcome procedural hurdles
- Democrats will continue to oppose major spending cuts and ideological riders

Major questions must be answered for work to be completed before Oct. 1

- How will Congress and White House find agreement on spending caps
 - Will the administration and House Freedom Caucus accept domestic spending levels greater than requested?
- Are policy riders as important with unified Republican control?
- How will appropriations fit into a packed agenda (ACA repeal, taxes, FBI, etc.)?
