New Jersey's Department of Children and Families is the state's designated family serving agency focused on and committed to assisting and empowering residents to be safe, healthy and connected through an array of programs and services that incorporate racial equity, family voice and a protective factors framework.













Reports of Child Abuse & Neglect are Down

Reports of Child Abuse & Neglect are called in to the State Central Registry for concerns of Child Protective Services or Child Welfare Services.

- In March 2019, there were 7,501
- In March 2020, there were 5,234
 - 30% reduction
- When students are not in school or seen by coaches, healthcare workers or law enforcement, there is a reduction in reporting.
- Incidents, however, tend to increase







Social Distance Shouldn't Mean Social Isolation #Bridge the Gap

Ensure social connections. Check on and offer remote support to families you know:

- with infants and young children
- that have children with special needs
- with a history of substance abuse
- who are under extreme stress due to unemployment, food insecurity or housing instability
- with a history of violence
- with a history of mental illness







COVID-19 Race Disparity

"The African American representation among fatalities is about 50% higher than the state's population," said Gov. Phil Murphy.

Of the first 3,564 deaths the state has complete information on, 49.9% of victims are white, 22.2% are black, 16.6% Hispanic or Latino, 5.5% Asian, 5.8% designated as "other."

The state's overall population, according to the census, is 54.9% white, 20% Hispanic or Latino, 15% black, 10% Asian



FAMILY SUCCESS CENTERS (FSC)

 At least 1 FSC in every New Jersey County

education, and much more

 Free services that encourage family interaction Activities and linkages to services like life skills, family health, employment, parent



KINSHIP NAVIGATOR (KNP)

- Helps relatives and/or family friends who care for non-biological children navigate through government networks Also covers children with
- special needs up to age 21 Call 2-1-1 to locate local agencies providing KNP





HOME VISITATION (HV)

- Families are partnered with HV professionals to receive early Multiple HV models
- · Voluntary and free services to eligible families
- Services include child development, healthy parent-child interaction, and importance of early learning/school



STRENGTHENING FAMILIES (SF) A Protective Factors (PF)

- approach on training and guidance to childcare providers
- Providers learn how to incorporate the PF in their partnerships with their parents and families
- Training provided by Child Care Resource Referral Agencies (CCR&R)



COUNTY COUNCILS FOR YOUNG CHILDREN

- Local social service planning councils for families with young children
- Located in all counties Made up of local parents and community members
- Members receive training and technical assistance in parent leadership and shared leadership models



CENTRAL INTAKE (CI)

- . Statewide network hub Resource information and referrals to local services that promote child and family
- wellness Service range includes prenantal to child care services, behavioral health domestic violence support, public assistance services, substance abuse treatment, and much more

 Partnerships (FCP) and available to all qualifying families with children in the listed age ranges. FCP is built on and comprised of best-practices and technical-assistance teams committed to building partnerships. Evidence-Based Home Visitation

The overall mission of the New Jersey Home Visiting Initiative is to improve the physical and emotional well-being of infants, children and their families in New Jersey by providing community-based education and in-home support to parents. Eligibility criteria for EBHV services vary by model, but typically programs begin working with families during pregnancy and continue until the child is age two or three.

Home visitors provide pregnant women and new parents with health information, parenting education, and linkages to other resources that support child and family well-being. DCF-funded EBHV models include:

- Healthy Families TANF Initiative for Parents (HF-TIP) pregnancy/birth to age three
- Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) first-time pregnancy to age two
- Parents As Teachers (PAT) pregnancy/infancy to preschool
- Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) age three to five















All EBHV Programs

All Home Visiting Programs are continuing to operate under guidance put forth by each of the models. All programs are providing virtual home visits until it is safe to resume in-person visits.

All programs are continuing to accept referrals through PRA-SPECT.

All programs are permitted to facilitate virtual enrollments to support families within their service area.
