



- Data often lag because of collection windows and quality checks.
- Many data not available or not comparable:
 - School meals
 - Chronic absenteeism
 - Standardized testing
- American Community Survey, 1-year estimates, not released for 2020.
 - 5-year estimates were released (2016-2020) on March 17, 2022



Despite this...


- Newark Kids Count 2022 includes the most current data available for many indicators.
- 2019 ACS data still provide a picture of conditions prior to the pandemic.
- New data have been included:
 - Student:Staff ratios
 - Teacher and administrator retention rates














Decline in Children under CP&P* Supervision

Newark Children Under CP&P Supervision






