## Child Care

"What I paid in child care was what it cost for me to go to college for a year!"

"There just are not enough facilities. Child care centers that serve the youngest children are under-resourced and having to make choices between quality and access for the community - that's a really tough choice to have to make."

## Paid Family Leave

"I was lucky enough to work for a fantastic organization that was really supportive, but I still had to go back to work while my baby was still in the NICU. He was born premature... [and] I shouldn't have had to do that."

## Social Emotional Development

"All of the daycares say, 'Well, we don't have the staff, we don't have the time, we don't have the money to deal with a special needs child.""

## NJ Babies At a Glance

102,000	Number of babies born in New Jersey every year
23%	Percent of expectant mothers who receive late or no prenatal care
66%	Percent of babies with all parents in the workforce
27%	Availability of licensed child care for NJ infants and toddlers with working parents
\$222	Median weekly cost for center-based child care for an infant

The science is clear. Our brains grow faster between the ages of 0 and 3 than at any other point in life. Those first few years lay a lasting foundation, affecting everything from classroom performance, to earning potential, to life expectancy.

When babies have nurturing relationships, positive early learning experiences and good nutrition, their neural connections are stimulated and strengthened, laying a strong foundation.

When babies don't get what their growing brains need to thrive, they don't develop as they should. This leads to life-long developmental, educational, social and health challenges.
